Purser Media Project

The Dorris Purser Media and Audio Project donation to Tennille United Methodist Church purchased a new 55" LCD television for the W. B. Smith Building. This television was first used for a presentation at Pete and Reba's 5 years Celebration Picnic on June 17, 2009. Pictures from their past 5 years of service at TUMC were enjoyed.

We will be using it for studies, presentations, and for broadcasting services from the sanctuary in the future.

The media committee has been gathering information on the technology available to complete the project. The goals for the project are to improve our ministry of sharing God's Good News with

- audio and video distribution to the W. B. Smith Building to accommodate large crowds
- audio assistance for the hearing impaired
- infrastructure to enhance our radio broadcasts and to enhance and provide for further distribution of church services and church events.



A Taste of Tennille

Just in case you don't remember our cookbook project that started as something cool to do for ourselves – we now find that we had much fun doing it and ended up spreading a lot of memories and joy AND although it was not a fund raising project we cleared \$2,105.77 and we haven't collected for all of the last shipment and still have about 15 books left. So – in summary we have sold 335 cookbooks, shared a lot of joy and fun, helped with the refurbishing of the nursery, and made a total of \$2,105.77 so far to be used in the nursery/Sunday School area.

What project do we want to do next?

Children, Cookbooks, Choir

How could all of these relate you ask. The annex to the sanctuary will soon undergo renovation to make attractive children's Sunday School rooms, a larger choir room, as well as a room to be used as a library. This project will be funded from the sale of cookbooks, recent memorial gifts (Lewis Lockhart, Ernest Deem, Dr. William Taylor and Joseph May, Paul Thiele, and Edith McMaster) and funds from the Charles V. Ouzts Trust Fund. The area behind the chancel as well as the side rooms will also undergo renovation. Please look at these areas now and then we can all anticipate the completion of the long-neglected project.

Trustees Report

The Trustees have been working on plans for two related major projects. At the request of the Church Council they have been developing a long-range plan for major maintenance needs and also for renovating the Old Sunday school rooms. The potential for the Old Sunday School became readily apparent after the renovation of the nursery and the amazing change wrought by the ladies who cleaned the whole place out of years of junk and unneeded stuff. This renovation project will become a reality thanks to the generosity of the Taylor family.

The Taylor family donation, memorials to Dr Taylor, memorials to Joseph May, Lewis Lockhart, Ernest Deem, Edith McMaster, and Paul Thiele, a donation from Allen and Selwyn May, the CV Ouzts Trust and other funds will be used to renovate the Old Sunday School, the side rooms to the sanctuary, the area behind the organ and some furniture in the Pastor's study. We are working on the final details and cost along with the builder and the Finance Committee. We anticipate this project along with some repair work will be scheduled soon.

With the help of Russell Brown we have a good idea of what other major maintenance will be needed and when. Some \$35,000 of other needs have been identified that should be done sooner rather than later. These include replacing the parsonage roof, painting the

church and WB Smith building and other smaller but important items. We have already corrected the extensive damage bats did to one room in the Old Sunday School. We are working with the Finance Committee on priorities and timing.

Bread of Life

The 2nd Wednesday evening each month Tennille United Methodist Church is participating in the *Bread of Life* program. This mission provides an evening meal to almost 70 needy persons in our community.

Tennille UMC is just one of the churches in Washington County that participates in the mission program called Bread of Life---(Sandersville Christian Church and Sandersville Methodist also do this). We get our list of recipients from Sandersville Christian Church (Anne Knox Hodges heads up this program at SCC). To this county-wide list we add local and area people that we know need some TLC. Each month we include 8 -12 of our local shut-ins. It is our belief that being needy doesn't mean just economic need!! We have a team of 22 people who have made the commitment to this mission. We divide the task so that there is a team who cooks the meals and a team that delivers to each of the homes. Because our numbers are so few, many do double duty! We have marvelous financial support from several members of Tennille UMC who are not able to participate actively, and

we absolutely could not do this mission without them.

If you are not involved in this mission, you are missing a great opportunity to serve God by serving your fellow man. All of the current participants of BOL feel blessed to be a part of this ministry.

2009 South Georgia Annual Conference Session

"Seek Ye First" was the theme for the 2009 South Georgia Annual Conference Session meeting June 7-10 in Columbus, Ga.

Bishop James R. King, Jr., presiding over his first Annual Conference session since becoming the resident bishop of the South Georgia Area, set the tone for the conference during the opening worship service on Monday morning.

In keeping with the theme, Bishop King challenged South Georgia United Methodist to seek God first and claim the slogan: "Growing a Christlike world."

"I want you to focus on five areas of your spiritual life in order to grow more like Christ: worship, Christian education, fellowship accountability, evangelism/witness and justice ministry," said Bishop King.

Special Offering: Central Conference Pension Initiative

Prior to this year's conference, congregations were encouraged to take up a special offering to support the Central Conference Pension Initiative (CCPI). Together South Georgia United Methodists had the privilege of making a significant difference, collecting over \$32,000. Bishop King announced at conference that these gifts have been made even more significant by a \$500,000 donation by an anonymous donor in Georgia, with another donation possible if individuals and churches in South and North Georgia show their support by making gifts and multi-year pledges before October 1.

Day of Service

On Tuesday morning of Annual Conference, conference members traded in their coats and ties, hung up the dresses and heels and put on t-shirts that proclaimed "Seeking the SON through service." More than 400 United Methodists spread out across the community to participate various service projects during the fourth annual Great Day of Service. As Bishop King toured several of the volunteer stations, he said he found love and justice being shown to some of Columbus' neediest citizens. "I saw these Christ-like images throughout Columbus, and that was so exciting," said Bishop King. "It's amazing how manageable the Kingdom of God really is."

Constitutional Amendments

In one of the major actions at the 2009 Annual Conference session, seven hundred fifty-eight conference members voted on 32 proposed constitutional amendments, many of them related to the denomination's structure as a global body. These amendments were approved at the 2008 General Conference session and are now being considered by every United Methodist Annual Conference. Only 5 of the 32 proposed amendments received affirmative support from South Georgia representatives: II, VIII, IX, XIX, XXII.

Along with Bishop King, worship leadership was provided by Bishop Marion Edwards in the Ordination Service, Dr. Hugh Davis in the Memorial Service and Dr. Evelyn Laycock in the Bible studies.
